Title of Pre-Reg: Evaluations of voting mechanisms

Arno Apffelstaedt and Jana Freundt

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We investigate how people evaluate majority voting procedures that are subject to what we term "malpractice": a fee that voters need to pay in order to make their vote count, a monetary incentive to submit a vote that is opposite to the original voting intention, the exclusion of voters whose annual household income is below a certain threshold.

We conduct a survey with participants from an online recruiting platform. Different groups of participants evaluate a voting procedure according to whether most people would agree that the procedure is (1) democratic, (2) representative, (3) inclusive, (4) appropriate, (5) fair, (6) legitimate, (7) acceptable, (8) corrupt, (9) flawed, (10) manipulated.

We hypothesize that compared to a standard majority vote, voting procedures that are subject to malpractice, regardless of its specific form, receive significantly lower ratings on items (1)-(7), and significantly higher ratings on items (8)-(10).

Experimental Design

We conduct a survey with participants from an online recruiting platform (Prolific Academic). Participants see the description of a choice situation from a previous study (Apffelstaedt (r) Freundt, 2020¹) that was conducted on the same platform. This situation entailed the election of a "code of conduct", which sets a (non-binding) behavioral rule demanding subjects to either share or not share their experimental income with others.

After reading through the details on how the code of conduct was elected (henceforth: voting procedure), survey participants are asked to rate the voting procedure on 10 dimensions: (1) democratic, (2) representative, (3) inclusive, (4) appropriate, (5) fair, (6) legitimate, (7) acceptable, (8) corrupt, (9) flawed, (10) manipulated (for details see section 'Planned Analysis' and the instructions attached to this document). Subjects are incentivized to match the modal answer in their treatment group: For one randomly selected rating dimension, the subject receives a bonus payment of £1.00 if her answer is identical with the answer most commonly given by the other participants in her treatment group.

Treatments. Treatments (between-subject) differ in the voting procedure which survey respondents have to evaluate. The survey has four main treatments: one control treatment (Baseline with a standard majority vote) and three "malpractice" treatments. The three malpractice treatments feature a majority vote that is subject to (1) a fee that voters need to pay in order to make their vote count (treatment Pay4Vote), (2) a monetary incentive to submit a vote that is opposite to the original voting intention (MoneyOffer), (3) the exclusion of votes from subjects whose annual household income is below a certain threshold (ExcludePoor). Each intervention is introduced to participants when we explain the voting procedure with the following announcement, respectively:

- Pay4Vote: "However, before the final votes were counted, each participant was asked to pay £0.20 to make his/her vote count. Only the votes of participants who agreed to pay were counted in the election. The votes of those participants who did not pay were not counted."
- MoneyOffer: "However, before the final votes were counted, each participant was
 offered an extra payment of £0.20 if he/she submits a vote that is opposite to what
 he/she originally wanted to vote for."
- ExcludePoor: "However, only the votes of participants with an annual household income above £ 40,000 were counted in the election. The votes of those participants who earn less than £ 40.000 a year were not counted."

For full instructions, see attached document. We compare the ratings of the voting procedure in *Baseline* with the ratings of the voting procedure in each of the malpractice treatments.

Additional to the four main treatments, we conduct an exploratory treatment *CostlyVoting*. In this treatment, survey respondents evaluate a majority vote that is subject to a fee that voters need to pay in order to be able to submit a vote. This intervention in the voting procedure is announced to participants as:

• CostlyVoting: "However, in order to be able to vote, each participant had to pay £0.20. If a participant decided not to pay, he/she was not able to submit a vote."

This treatment is exploratory and we refrain from stating any hypotheses about how the ratings of this voting procedure will differ from the ratings in the other treatments.

Procedures. Participants see the description of the voting procedure and are then asked to rate the voting procedure on dimensions (1)-(10). Participants go through the 10 ratings item by item (screen by screen). They rate the procedure on the positive dimensions (1-7) first and then on the negative dimensions (8-10). Items are randomized within each block. At the end of the survey, participants answer a short questionnaire (7 questions) on their political and general views. For the exact procedure, please find the full instructions of the *Baseline* treatment in the Appendix.

The survey is implemented with a fixed base payment of £1.00 on Prolific. The survey takes about 10 minutes to complete. Participants can earn an additional payment of £1.00 for one randomly selected rating in which their evaluation matches the modal evaluation among the other participants in their treatment group.

Selection Criteria. To be eligible to participate, we require that participants have filled in information on their Nationality, Gender, and Country of Birth. We exclude all participants who have participated in any version of our related previous study (Apffelstaedt (r) Freundt, 2020) and do not allow subjects to participate in multiple treatments. In case of double participation, both entries will be deleted from the data. For comparability, we aim to match the regions in our previous study (Apffelstaedt (r) Freundt, 2020). For that reason, we pre-set 20% of places to be filled with participants from continental Western Europe, 30% from the UK, 20% of places to be filled by US American and Canadian subjects, and 30% with participants of Non-Western nationality.

Planned Analyses

Outcomes. Outcomes are the ratings of the voting mechanism in each treatment. All 10 ratings are on a 6-point Likert scale, from "(Most people would) strongly disagree" to "(Most people would) strongly agree". We convert the answers on the Likert scale to a numeric format according to the following convention:

- Strongly disagree = -1
- Disagree = -2/3
- Somewhat disagree = -1/3
- Somewhat agree = +1/3
- Agree = +2/3
- Strongly agree = +1

Composite Indices. We will build the following composite indices by averaging across items:

- Rating_Index (all items 1-10). For this index, ratings on negative dimensions (items 8, 9, and 10) will be reversed.
- Democracy_Index (items 1-3)
- Positive Index (items 1-7)
- Negative Index (items 8, 9, 10)

Main hypothesis. The voting procedure in each of the malpractice treatments (Pay4Vote, MoneyOffer, and ExcludePoor) is rated significantly less positively than a standard majority vote (Baseline).

Hypotheses Tests. To test our main hypothesis, we will run non-parametric Mann-Whitney U tests on the composite indices. Specifically, these tests compare the rank in the Rating_Index of each malpractice treatment with the rank of the Baseline treatment. We will accept the hypothesis if the Mann-Whitney U test confirms a significant (p<.05) decrease for each malpractice treatment relative to the Baseline. We will complement these non-parametric tests with regressions to control for sample differences in demographic variables.

Additional Analyses. Additionally, the main hypothesis will be tested on the three additional indices Democracy_Index, Positive_Index, and Negative_Index for which we expect to also observe a significant decrease for each malpractice treatment relative to *Baseline* (respectively, a significant increase in the Negative_Index).

Differences between the three malpractice treatments and the analyses of a possibly different impact of malpractice on each of the individual ranking dimensions (1)-(10) are exploratory. Treatment *CostlyVoting* will be compared to the *Baseline* and *Pay4Vote* treatments (without forming ex-ante hypotheses).

Planned Number of Observations

Each participant generates one observation for each ranking dimension. We plan to have 100 participants per treatment, that is, $5 \times 100 = 500$ observations in total.

These participants were recruited on Prolific knowing that they will participate in a lottery that pays £100 in cash to one of the 100 participants (the lottery cash prize was paid out in addition to a fixed base payment that each participant received).

Upon entering the survey, participants were instructed that the **lottery tickets for the** £100 cash prize will be distributed unequally: While 50 out of the 100 participants will each receive 10 lottery tickets, the other half of the participants will receive no lottery tickets.

All 100 participants were then asked whether – in the case of receiving lottery tickets – they would like to give away 3 of their 10 lottery tickets to one of those participants who did not receive any tickets. Each participant could choose between two possible actions:

- **GIVE**: "If I receive lottery tickets, I want to give away 3 lottery tickets to a nonreceiver."
- DON'T GIVE: "If I receive lottery tickets, I do not want to give away 3 lottery tickets a nonreceiver."

A code of conduct

Before anyone made the decision of whether to GIVE or DON'T GIVE, a code of conduct was set. The code of conduct either told participants that everyone should choose to give (⇒RULE: GIVE) or that everyone should choose to not give (⇒RULE: DON'T GIVE). Only one of the two rules was implemented.

The code of conduct was determined in the following way:

- All 100 participants of the study were asked to vote for the rule (RULE: GIVE or RULE: DON'T GIVE) they preferred to have implemented as the code of conduct.
- The rule for which more votes were counted was implemented as the code of conduct.

After the code of conduct was set, each participant decided individually whether to GIVE or DON'T GIVE under the selected code of conduct. This means that each individual could decide privately and anonymously whether he/she wanted to follow the elected rule or not. The winner of the lottery was subsequently determined by randomly picking one of the distributed lottery tickets as the winning ticket. 
